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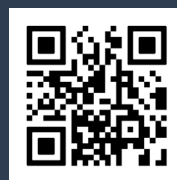


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Welcome to StAnza 2026

Last year, I heard Vicki Feaver speak about living with Parkinson's and the changes it has brought to her life and work. Introducing one of her unflinching new poems, she described a support group she attends and said, simply: "It reminds you that you are not alone."

That is also what good poetry does. Make no mistake, in this world there is illness. Grief. Injustice. Sadness. Anxiety. Sacred spaces and desecrated spaces.

Because of the omnipresence of these realities, we've built our 2026 festival around the belief that "You Are Not Alone".

There is comfort and courage in that phrase, and we want our festival to say it to everyone who joins us online or in person. Wherever you are, whatever you are going through, living with, celebrating or overcoming, you are not alone.

Poetry at its best exposes the lie of solitude, names it and makes what remains more bearable. It gives language to what we thought was secret, private, unsayable. Reading itself is often solitary, yet a festival transforms it into something communal: conversations spark, experiences echo and chime, the individual and peculiar is shared. It would be foolish to think we can fully understand another person's lived experience through a poem, but their poems can let us in and get us, at least, a little closer.

For 2026, we aim to celebrate that. To feel strength in numbers and hold our candles up together against the encroaching dark. To that end, we have gathered poets whose work is singular in its originality, communal in scope, open and honest in its telling. As you move through these three days, from readings to conversations to moments of quiet encounter, we hope you'll feel the connective tissue binding us together and will remember: You Are Not Alone.

We're glad to have you with us.

Exhibitions

In our 2026 exhibitions you'll find work shaped through collaboration and conversation. You can immerse yourself in playful, imagined histories or view work responding to real events that have left a lasting mark on their communities. These are works that bear witness; works that create and demand connection.

A Cairngorm Love Affair by Alan Grieve & Eddie Summerton

Byre Theatre: Level 4 Foyer | 13-31 March

Presented with **North Sea Poets**, this part-real, part-imagined collection of mountain lore and ephemera entices you into a world all its own, complete with its own pop-up gift shop. Wander off the well-trodden path to grab a granite night.

Alan Grieve and **Eddie Summerton** exhibit individually, nationally and internationally and operate together as the art group A+E. Their collaborative work presents a humorous and irreverent exploration of memories and mythologies of landscape and objects across multiple platforms and events, ranging from galleries and museums to publications and public art.

A Cairngorm Love Affair is premiering at StAnza: Scotland's International Poetry Festival and will return later in the year to Kirkcaldy Galleries as part of Fife Contemporary's 20th anniversary celebrations.

Powódź/Flood by Natalia Bocian with a poetic response from Nazaret Ranea

Laidlaw Music Centre: Foyer & Online | 6-31 March

Natalia Bocian explores the global impacts of the climate emergency through personal and communal storytelling. Drawing on source documents, historical records and first-hand accounts, she transforms real events into paintings that reflect the disjointed experience of trauma and memory. Powódź revisits the catastrophic 1997 flood in Bocian's home city in Poland, tracing how communities remember, rebuild and remain connected through shared experience.

In June 2024, water levels in Poland again surpassed those of 1997, challenging the long-held belief that such floods were once-in-a-century events and underscoring the urgency at the heart of Bocian's work.

Poet **Nazaret Ranea** responds to Bocian's paintings with a specially commissioned audio piece installed alongside which draws on her own research into flood histories in Spain. Her poetry, often woven from survivors' testimonies, invites listeners into a shared act of remembrance and resilience.

white cubes – a pop-up exhibition by off-page vispo

Byre Theatre: Level 1 Foyer & Bar | 13-15 March

'white cubes' is a specially curated anthology/exhibition brought together by off-page, the team behind Glasgow's annual peer-led development programme for writers and artists with a curiosity about visual poetry and the poetic visual.

For StAnza 2026, **CD Boyland**, **Julie Laing** and **Leo Plumb** have worked with previous off-page participants to produce a pop-up version. Framed and contained by one of the world's most iconic pieces of display furniture, the collected works reimagine two traditional formats – the white cube gallery and the poetry anthology.
